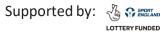

Achievements to date until July 2022

- ✓ We have reviewed our range of clubs taking place after school including; football clubs, Forest Schools and Street Dance.
- ✓ We will be continue to offer a bursary for pupil premium children to participate in these clubs
- ✓ The majority of funding last year was spent on SMART Moves taught by Sports Coach (£7,264.62)in order to ensure specific intervention for children with gross and fine motor difficulties as well as social/collaboration/sportsmanship skills as a key area of Catch-Up for our KS1 children
- ✓ We ran a Sports day for all Year groups in Term 6
- ✓ We provided CPD for opportunities for staff, which have been developed this year in line with the new online resources for Real PE and Gymnastics.
- ✓ Use of Jasmine for Dance curriculum has improved skills and lessons in this area of the curriculum.
- ✓ Involvement in some Virtual Leagues competitions.
- ✓ Y2 Children attended the North Somerset Dance Festival
- ✓ Y6 Play Leaders improved playtimes this year playing games with children across the infant school.
- ✓ Sign-posting sporting events to children and families through our newsletter e.g. Yatton park Run.
- ✓ Celebrating children's talent gymnastics at Yatton's Got Talent event at end of Term 6.
- ✓ Learning College back with football coaches and Bushcraft/ Forest Schools

Areas of further development and baseline evidence of need

- ✓ Continue to provide children with the opportunity to take part in competitive sports in intra school competitions through the NSSPEA
- ✓ Continue to make lunchtimes be more active with use of sports equipment-SMSAs, Sports coach and Sports Leaders to be trained from the Juniors to provide additional support in the infants – investigate increasing Sports coach or Lead SMSA. As lunchtime provides an opportunity for daily exercise we want to expand the opportunities for energetic play.
- ✓ New PE Subject Leader in 2022 train/ work with Junior Sports Lead and NSSPEA
- Review the teaching of Real PE and use of Jasmine on-line resource skills and confidence audit of lessons/classes not taught by Sports Coach in academic year 2022/23
- ✓ Update the school noticeboard and website to promote sport at Yatton Schools.
- ✓ Continue to provide SMART Moves for children with gross/fine motor difficulties.
- ✓ Continue to provide Learning College to offer new Sports activities to children e.g. Archery, ballet, karate.
- ✓ To continue our Healthy Schools Status-Plan.
